#### MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

The Davis Tennis Club Board has been busy this year and I'd like to share some of our accomplishments. The Board created a Community Tennis Plan with the goal of persuading City and School District officials to address the overwhelming need of repairs that plague our courts. The courts have been sorely neglected along with other City recreational fields and facilities. The Community Tennis Plan has helped in our efforts to persuade the City to commit \$125,000 toward rehabilitating the Walnut Tennis Complex. We hope this step breathes life into that dying complex.

The Community Tennis Plan also came into focus during the first meeting between our city liaison George Haver and the new Davis Joint Unified School District's facilities director, George Parker. Mr. Parker stated that although the School District is not contractually obligated to maintain the Davis High School courts, he is nevertheless working toward repairing and resurfacing courts 1-7.

Although courts 8-12 are in worse condition, Mr. Parker feels that he will have more success repairing courts 1-7 than attempting to replace courts 8-12. He has agreed to look into alternate funding sources, including securing private funding, for replacing courts 8-12.

The Board is forging a relationship with other community tennis clubs and the recreation tennis group at UCD to create a more county-wide tennis scene. One idea is to create a Yolo Team Tennis league modeled after World Team Tennis, where teams have at least 5 players, male and female, who each participate in a shortened-match format where all games count toward determining the league champion. In other business, we moved the message board from the Walnut Complex to the Davis High School\Community Courts where we feel it will be better used. It's designed to publicize dropin play dates, tennis socials, tournaments and other club happenings. The DTC Board is looking forward to the New Year, as we hope our courts in City parks and on school property will get the attention they deserve. We need all members to show their support at City Council meetings and to attract the attention our tennis facilities need. I look forward to bringing good things to our small but mighty tennis community in 2016.

In the past year your dues have been used in the following ways to promote tennis locally.

- 1. Paying quarterly fees to the City of Davis for use of the courts at Davis High School.
- 2. Obtaining liability insurance through USTA to cover DTC-sponsored activities.
- 3. Sponsoring several DTC club socials with the intent of attracting new members and strengthening bonds among current members.
- 4. Maintaining tennis infrastructure in Davis by making clubhouse improvements and buying new squeegees, nets, and a bulletin board.
- 5. Paying dues and maintaining relationships with the Sacramento Area Tennis Association (SATA) and United States Tennis Association (USTA).
- 6. Working with Pam Mainini, CPA, to prepare tax returns and maintain our non-profit status.

Note that new registration procedures will begin in Spring 2016! Area captains will register teams without paying a fee. Once the coordinators have determined that there are enough teams for a league, captains will be notified that individual players can sign up for their team. Individual players must have a SATA login and password and pay \$10 to register for each team they play on; there are no refunds or carryover of unused fees. The good news: captains play for free! # **Local Non-League Tennis Winning Points**

Over the past few years, Davis women's tennis has "flexed" its muscles. Based on the success of a local round-robin doubles group in town, a casual singles flex "league" was created just over a year ago and is completing its third season. The Davis Flex provides casual yet competitive match play without the travel commitments of SATA or USTA. Players schedule their own matches and report scores to the coordinator. Based on wins/losses, players move up or down a division. The league has been very popular and has encouraged people to try singles without the pressure of ratings or team standings. 




#### Winter reminders

#### Welcome the Crickets – no, not Buddy Holly

You have probably seen Dr. Ann Hedrick and her team wonder around the tennis courts looking for crickets. Let's satisfy our curiosity and learn more about her and the crickets.

Please give a brief introduction about yourself to the tennis community: I am an Adjunct Professor at UCD in the Department of Neurobiology, Physiology and Behavior. My specialty is behavior, specifically animal personality. I conduct my research on crickets. Believe it or not, crickets show personalities: different crickets behave differently than others. For example, males that are more aggressive are also bolder towards predators, and other males that aren't as aggressive are more fearful of predators.

What do you do with the crickets you catch? I catch crickets at the tennis courts, because they fly to the lights and then drop onto the courts, where they are easy to capture. I then take them to my lab at UCD and we perform behavioral experiments on them. We also allow the females to lay eggs so we can rear more crickets during the fall and winter.

What time of year/what time of day do you catch them? I capture the crickets during July and August when they are most common, and usually from 9-11 pm when they are active on the courts.

How is the interaction between you/your team of catchers with the tennis players when looking for crickets? Most tennis players are very kind and allow us to come onto the courts when their game is not ongoing. A few even help us get the crickets. Unfortunately, a small minority are hostile, but that is rare.

Any other comments you would like to add to the tennis community? I'd like to thank the helpful tennis players! Also, please remember us and do not stomp on the crickets. We would like to use them in our research, and it is important to know that we do not ever kill them or perform harmful experiments on them. Thanks!
